Pinehurst Government and Structure

The Village is governed by a Mayor and a four-member Council. All are elected in non-partisan races, held in odd-numbered years, and serve four-year staggered terms. The Village has chosen the Council/Manager form of government which generally gives policy-making responsibility to the Council and administrative responsibilities, including personnel decisions, to the Manager. The Manager and elected officials work hand in hand to ensure that they develop sound policies, plans and financial decisions. Village Council meetings and work sessions are open to the public. The meetings are typically held in Assembly Hall at Village Hall, 395 Magnolia Road, Pinehurst. Council members conduct regular meetings on the 4th Tuesday of the month at 4:30 p.m.

Culture, Arts, Recreation, and Dining

Rich in history and tradition, beautiful Pinehurst was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1996. Pinehurst offers unparalleled accommodations and a unique combination of cultural, recreational, dining and shopping opportunities.

GOLF

Pinehurst Country Club has consistently been ranked as one of the finest golf resorts in the nation and the world. In addition to the nine Pinehurst Resort courses, there are over thirty other golf courses in the vicinity. The 1999 and 2005 US Opens were played on Pinehurst No. 2. In 2014, for the first time ever, both the Men's and Women's US Opens were held in back-to-back weeks at Pinehurst No. 2. The Village of Pinehurst and Pinehurst No. 2 have been selected to again host the men's US Open in 2024.

The Pinehurst area is also home to the U.S. Kid's and Teen's World Championships each year in late July and early August. The U.S. Kids World Championships is the largest and most prestigious event in the world for players 12 and under and attracts over 1,200 participants from across the United States and from more than 20 countries abroad each year.

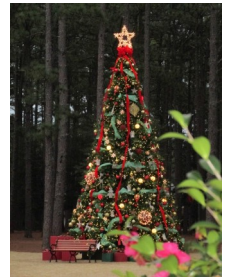
The traditional North and South tournament and junior tournaments also call Pinehurst home. If you love the game of golf, you now live in a golfing paradise.



OTHER EXPERIENCES

Golf is at the heart of Pinehurst but by no means is it the sole definition of the Pinehurst experience. Tennis and equestrian activities share a rich and renowned tradition in the area. Other sports include cycling, swimming, croquet, lawn bowling, and hiking. The Pinehurst Harness Track and surrounding horse farms provide opportunities for equestrian experiences. Visitors and residents enjoy rides on horse-drawn carriages through the Village. CULTURE AND ARTS

Art Galleries, pottery shops, antique shops, parades, and community celebrations provide broad cultural experiences for residents. Visiting symphony orchestras, as well as our own Carolina Philharmonic, provide frequent concerts in the Village. Theater productions and dance programs are also available. Many residents take advantage of local programs like the Arts Council of Moore County to travel to Raleigh for unique cultural events. Literary endeavors are important to local residents and are supported by the Given Memorial Library and other groups.

Dining – For a relatively small community, the Pinehurst area offers quite an extensive choice of dining opportunities. Fine dining is available in quaint locally owned restaurants and hotels featuring traditional American cuisine, Italian, Mediterranean, Asian, seafood, both in upscale and casual settings. Also, not far away in our neighboring towns, you will find a wide variety of restaurants including steak and seafood chains, Chinese, Mexican, Japanese, Italian, pubs and sports bars, and more. Restaurant guides are published in our local newspaper and booklets are available at the Welcome Center (located in the Theatre Building) and through the Moore County Chamber of Commerce – www.moorecountychamber.com.

Clubs and Groups – If you can imagine it, chances are that somewhere in the Pinehurst area there is a club or group that supports your hobby or interest. A wide variety of organizations are available for topics such as books, bridge, arts, crafts, gardening, woodworking, and quilting. The Sandhills Community College also offers a vast array of continuing education courses for the public. Check local publications for these organizations.

Additionally, there is a Farmer’s Market from April to October at Tufts Memorial Park in the Village twice a week on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Downtown Pinehurst also annually hosts the Holly Festival in October with artisans, food, music, and more.

Recreation – The Village of Pinehurst opened its brand new Community Center in January 2020 located adjacent to Cannon Park at the corner of Rattlesnake Trail and Hwy 211. The Pinehurst Parks and Recreation Department supports the Fair Barn, Harness Track, Rassic Wicker Park, Arboretum, Tufts Park, and West Pinehurst Park (www.pinehurstrec.org).

Our Splash Pad, located in Rassic Wicker Park, is open from Memorial Day to Labor Day. It is free of charge and usually open from 10 am to 7 pm daily.

Pinehurst Resort members have access to the beach and marina at Lake Pinehurst as well as wonderful swim complex at the Member’s Club.



Rassic Wicker Park—Located at 10 Wicker Drive, in addition to being the home of our Splash Pad, this is a 103 acre facility where the Village Hall, Police Station, and Fire Station are located. Amenities include two shuffleboard and bocceball courts, two tennis court, a soccer field, and in-line hock rink, a playground, paved walking trails, brick sidewalks, and expanded trail system that ties into the Greenway and Arboretum area. There is also a restroom facility.

Cannon Park—Located at 90 Woods Road, this is a 15 acre facility with restrooms, a concession stand, two baseball/softball fields, a covered picnic shelter and a small practice soccer field. It also provides access to trails and is home to Camelot Playground. The picnic shelter and ball fields may be reserved for a minimal fee.

Arboretum—Located just below Village Hall (395 Magnolia Road) this was developed by the Village Heritage Foundation. The Magnolia Lawn, Joyce’s Meadow, the Pergola Garden, and the Timmel Pavilion may all be reserved for weddings, receptions, and other events.

The Pinehurst Harness Track - Located at 200 Beulah Hill Road, this is a 111 acre equestrian facility that has been a winter training center for Standardbred horses since 1915. This facility also hosts several shows and events from May through September including dressage, polocrosse, hunter/jumper events, pleasure driving, and more.

The Fair Barn—Located at 200 Beulah Hill Road, this facility is on the grounds of the Harness Track and turned 100 years old in 2017. It is the oldest surviving early twentieth –century fair exhibition hall in North Carolina. This facility is a multi-purpose community gathering place for weddings, exhibitions, receptions, private parties, business seminars, concerts, art and antique shows, and any other functions requiring a large and flexible space.

West Pinehurst Park—Located at 861 Chicken Plant Road, this is where the Village of Pinehurst Disc Golf Course is located.

Equipment for the following activities may be checked out at the Community Center at no charge:

Shuffleboard, Bocce Ball, Disc Golf, Pickleball, Horseshoes



Pinehurst Greenway Trails – People of all ages enjoy walking, jogging, or biking along the trail that runs through the Pinehurst area. The corridor of green space includes woods and open meadows. The Greenway Wildlife Habitat Committee is responsible for the Pinehurst Conservation Commission’s efforts to protect the habitats for wildlife in public areas starting with the Pinehurst Greenway. The Parks and Recreation Department is responsible for constructing the trails. When completed, the trail will cover 24 miles through Pinehurst.

There are parking areas for the trails at Rassie Wicker Park (10 Rassie Wicker Drive) and at the corner of Rassie Wicker Drive and McKenzie Roads.

Golf Carts



The Village of Pinehurst is one of the few communities in North Carolina that allows golf carts to drive on municipal streets. Golf carts must be registered at Village Hall. There is a one time fee of \$20 (which is good for the life of your cart) and you will receive a set of stickers for your cart as well as a copy of the municipal code and a map of where carts are allowed to drive.



A Brief history of Pinehurst and the Village

Looking for a place to build a health-oriented resort, James Walker Tufts (head of the Arctic Soda Foundation) stopped in the Sandhills area in the spring of 1895. Despite the fact that the area had been almost completely clear-cut by the timber industry, something about this area moved him, and in June 1895, he bought 598 acres of land for nearly \$1.25 per acre around what is now the Village Center. On June 20, 1895, Tufts contacted Frederick Law Olmsted, the designer of Central Park in New York and the landscape designer of the Biltmore estate in Asheville, North Carolina, to help him create a first-rate resort. That summer, with the new plan in hand, 450 men began construction on what was originally referred to as Tuftstown. Tufts selected the name Pinehurst for his resort out of a list of non-winning names for a new town on Martha's Vineyard. On New Year's Eve 1895, the Holly Inn opened and Pinehurst was on its way. The Carolina Hotel opened in 1901. Tufts brought Donald Ross, golf course designer, to Pinehurst to head Golf Operations. Ross built award-winning Course No. 2 as well as Courses 1 and 3.

THE BEGINNINGS: Since all of the early buildings of Pinehurst stood on barren land, Tufts hired Warren Manning to plant over 222,000 tree seedlings and other plants (47,250 of these were imported from France) around Pinehurst to give the resort the natural beauty we all still enjoy today. For many years, Pinehurst was a privately held resort under sole proprietorship of the Tufts family. The Tufts family controlled all aspects of the resort and closely monitored all types of activities, including the creation of its first 9-hole golf course in February 1898, and the continued acquisition of more land.

In 1920, a corporate form of ownership was established when a charter for Pinehurst, Inc. was obtained from the North Carolina Secretary of State. Tufts considered incorporating the Village as a municipality in 1926, but he felt that a lack of year-round residents and state tax laws would not be able to sustain it.



THE CAROLINA HOTEL

A HISTORY OF COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT: During the Great Depression, as other resorts began to fail, property owners in Pinehurst agreed to pay more taxes in order to support the resort through the Depression and ensure that it would not fail like the surrounding resorts. During World War II, Pinehurst served as a support area for neighboring Fort Bragg and many servicemen were either residents or visitors.

IT'S MODERN BEGINNINGS: It was not until 1960 that Pinehurst became a year-round resort with the introduction of air conditioning and swimming pools at the resort facilities. By the late 1960s, however, Pinehurst's days as a paternalistic resort under the Tufts were coming to an end.

Realizing that the resort was 75 years old and in need of significant investment to update and improve the resort facilities, the Tufts heirs sold Pinehurst, Inc., including the resort and approximately 7,500 acres of land, to the Diamondhead Corporation for \$9.2 million in January 1971. It was under Diamondhead's control that the creation and sale of lots with membership rights to the Pinehurst resort facilities began.

Advertisements were placed in newspapers around the country, and people were flown in to play golf and purchase a lot. Lake Pinehurst was created to enhance the residential neighborhood, new recreational improvements were made (including Course Number 6 in the late 1970s), and infrastructure was put into place to support the new development. However, all this activity was not considered to be progress by local residents.

Since Pinehurst was not a full municipality, there were no building inspections, no planning or zoning regulations, and no real means for the concerns of the residents to be acted upon. After several years of debate among residents over whether to seek incorporation as a full municipality or continue to allow Diamondhead to coordinate affairs, it was decided by a majority in 1980 that Pinehurst would function most effectively independently of the Diamondhead Corporation.

MORE THAN A RESORT DESTINATION: In 1980, with a population of 1,746 residents, Pinehurst was granted full incorporation as a municipality and was, for the first time, more than just a privately run resort. This important change occurred under the leadership and influence of a small group of citizens that had just formed as the Pinehurst Civic Group. In 1984, Club Corporation of America, owned by Robert Dedmon, Sr. purchased Pinehurst Resort and restored it to its unique, traditional roots.

AS of 2020, the Village of Pinehurst’s population is just under 17,000. Many of our new residents come from across the country, if not the world, to settle in this “village in the forest”. When asked what brought them here, many cited ambiance, community character and spirit as their reasons for choosing the area.

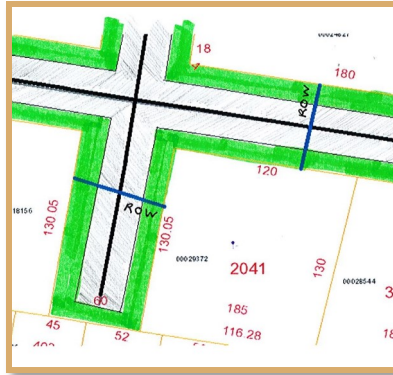

RIGHT OF WAY (ROW)



The Right of Way (ROW) is defined as an area owned or maintained by the Village, the state, a public utility, a railroad, or a private concern that extends beyond the road into what residents may consider to be their property.
