### Fourthfest Fireworks & Parade Canceled

After careful consideration, the Village of Pinehurst made the difficult decision to cancel the Fourthfest fireworks display scheduled for July 3 and the Fourthfest parade scheduled for July 4. Both events were canceled due to concerns with anticipated crowd size in relation to the COVID-19 mass gathering limitations currently in place.

"This decision was extremely difficult as we know the Village's Fourthfest celebration is a treasured community tradition. Village staff considered every option and came to the conclusion that the best decision for the health and safety of our community is to cancel these events," said Village Manager Jeff Sanborn.



"The decision to cancel our Fourthfest events had to be made well in advance because of the amount of time and effort that goes into planning them," said Parks & Recreation Director Mark Wagner. "Planning and executing these events involves many people – from our staff, to the vendors, to all the parade participants. We had to make the call early enough so that people can plan accordingly."

The Village will continue to monitor the COVID-19 situation and follow the guidance provided by the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services and Governor Cooper. Additional closings or interruptions in service may be necessary and that information will be posted on our website and social media.

# Celebrating 125 Years of Pinehurst



In recognition of the Village of Pinehurst's 125th anniversary, from June to December we will tell the story of how the Village came to be. Through a series of articles, we will document the unique events that led to the founding of our Village. Although the story of Pinehurst has been told in numerous publications and writings, we will focus on those events that are less well known, but fundamental to the creation of the Village 125 years ago.



125th anniversary articles will include:

- The Sandhills of Moore County: how the area was formed and why this unique geological formation is a factor in our Village history
- The Longleaf Forest and the tar, turpentine and lumber industry the major industry in the area in the late 1800s
- Railroads that supported the area and industry in the Sandhills and then became a factor in the formation of the Village
- The life of James Walker Tufts, founder of Pinehurst, and his development of the soda fountain business that created the wealth to build Pinehurst
- What led James Walker Tufts to decide to build a "Health Resort," his efforts to discover a location for the project, and how he came to decide the best place to build his village was the Sandhills
- James Walker Tufts' property acquisition for the Village and an early assessment of the site
- The role of the famous landscape designer Fredrick Law Olmsted and his assistant Warren Manning in the design and the plans for the Village
- The Village construction scene during the second half of 1895
- How the Village came to be named "Pinehurst"
- Mr. Tufts' communications advertising the Village to Boston physicians and letters to his wife about the venture in the fall of 1895
- The opening of the Village and what was available to the first guests

## Library Needs Assessment Update

The Village of Pinehurst is currently performing an in-depth Library Services Needs Assessment to determine the community's need for public library services in Pinehurst. The Given Memorial Library, located in the heart of the Village, is operated by a private 501c(3) non-profit organization. The Village currently augments private funding of the library with a \$150,000 annual contribution to help provide free library services to Pinehurst residents. This private funding model may not be sustainable long term so the Village Council is investigating ways to ensure current and future resident needs for library services can be met.



As part of the assessment process, the Village obtained public input through a variety of means and is currently in the process of conducting a mailed survey of randomly selected households. To date, hundreds of Pinehurst residents have provided input on the Library Services Needs Assessment through four primary public input methods:

- 1. Online Survey 386 residents completed an online survey that was conducted from January 28 to March 2, 2020.
- 2. Public Input Meetings 115 residents attended two Public Input Meetings at Assembly Hall on February 18 and 19.
- Community Conversations 53 volunteer residents who were carefully chosen from more than 100 applicants to provide representation from a variety of Pinehurst neighborhoods and diversity in age, gender, occupation, children in the household, and library users/non-users participated in one of four 1 ½ hour Community Conversations.
- Personal Interviews 26 individuals representing Village Council Members, Village staff, business leaders including the Pinehurst Resort, West Pine Middle School students, education leaders, and Given Memorial Library leaders participated in personal interviews.

In late summer or early fall, the Village Council will use the results of all public input received to determine what library services Pinehurst residents need and how the Village can best meet those needs.

# Parks & Recreation Program & Facility Updates



Due to COVID-19 restrictions, spring Parks & Recreation programs and special events were canceled, and the Community Center was closed to the public through June 15. The phased reopening plan outlined by Governor Cooper allows us to gradually return to normal operations, which includes holding youth day camps and opening the Splash Pad.

Youth day camps will be held with reduced numbers at the Cannon Park Community Center the week of July 6th through the week of August 7th. During this time, per the North Carolina Department of Health & Human Services' COVID-19 guidelines and recommendations, no

other activities will be held in the Community Center. Should the Governor's Phase 3 guidelines allow more flexibility, staff will be prepared to offer additional in-person classes, programs, and open gym times to the public.

The Splash Pad at Wicker Park is tentatively scheduled to open on July 6th as we anticipate being able to accommodate larger crowds during Phase 3. Attendance may still be limited and will be monitored by staff to ensure compliance with guidelines and recommendations based on the available square footage of the wet decking. More information regarding the Splash Pad and opening of other facilities will be available once the announcement to transition into Phase 3 is made.

### Golf Cart Smarts

An enjoyable part of living in Pinehurst is having the option to drive golf carts on Village streets. However, it is important to remember that drivers must meet the following requirements:

- Drivers must yield to all vehicular and pedestrian traffic.
- Drivers must possess a valid driver's license issued by the state of North Carolina.
- Golf carts may cross over, but not operate directly on NC 211, US 15-501, NC 5, NC 2, Morganton Road or Linden Road.
- Golf carts may not operate in the hospital district: Page Drive, Aviemore Drive, Memorial Drive, and Regional Drive.
- Golf carts may not operate on greenway trails.
