Golf Cart Stickers Required to Utilize Carts on Village Streets

The Village of Pinehurst began issuing golf cart stickers on July 1 to all cart owners who wish to drive on Village streets. Cart owners may acquire the stickers by completing the registration form at the Pinehurst Village Hall.


Cart owners are currently required to bring with them a certificate of insurance demonstrating that they carry \$300,000 liability insurance for the golf cart when they register their cart. The insurance requirement is subject to change as it is currently under review. In addition, golf carts operating on Village streets must have a side view or rear view mirror for safety and if being driven one hour before sunrise or one hour after sunset, must possess front and rear lights.

Cart owners need not bring their carts to Village Hall but must present the certificate of insurance and certify on a registration form that their carts meet the safety requirements. The cost of the registration sticker is \$5 and is good until December 31, 2011. After that date, cart registration will be renewed annually each December.

The plan to implement the issuance of cart stickers became necessary when the Alternative Energy subcommittee to the Village's Conservation Commission made a recommendation to the Village Council, at an April work session, that golf carts should also be allowed in business areas within the Village. Golf carts at the time were only allowed on Village streets for purposes of traveling to and from golf courses as long as they had a sticker issued by Pinehurst Country Club as a member of their Trail Club. The Alternative Energy sub-committee strives to help the Village save energy and reduce its carbon footprint.

At the Village Council work session on May 11, 2010, Council adopted an ordinance allowing carts in business areas and a text amendment was adopted by Village Council on June 8, 2010. The ordinance and text amendment effectively changed the stickering requirement so that all carts operating on Village streets have a Village—issued sticker, whether they are stickered by the Pinehurst Country Club or not. This change was made in order to ensure all carts are registered in a fair and equitable manner.

Care For Animals In Summer Weather And Year Round

Periodically the Village receives complaints or concerns about the care and well being of domestic pets in the Village. Residents are reminded that dogs are required to be on a leash or other type of restraint if off of the owner's property.

Different methods are used in the Village to keep dogs from leaving their owner's property, and these usually are invisible fences, traditional fencing, fenced dog runs or keeping dogs inside of dwellings. The Moore County Animal Control Ordinance, which has been adopted by the Pinehurst Village Council, makes it unlawful to tether, chain or fasten an animal in such a manner as to cause it injury or pain, or not permit it to reach shelter, food or water. Animals are also required to receiver proper food, an adequate supply of fresh potable water, and access to shelter appropriate to the species.

Residents who have concerns about animal care or witness possible violations of these regulations are encouraged to contact the Pinehurst Police Department at 910-295-3781.



COMMUNITY WATCH

The Pinehurst Police Department and Community Watch are in the process of placing new "COMMUNITY WATCH" signs in various areas around Pinehurst. The new signs will be placed at entrances to housing developments where possible. The new signs are larger and more obvious than the old green signs with white lettering. The older green signs will still be utilized in

some neighborhoods, however. It is hoped that the new signs will make those with possible "criminal intent" aware that we are an active "Watch" community.

Police Department daily activity logs indicate our Watch program is working. More and more, citizens are calling in suspicious persons, vehicles, or activities. As our adopted motto says, "If you see something, say something", report it by calling 295-3141. 911 always remains an option for any emergency.

August 3rd is designated as National Night Out, a time when communities across the nation can show their support for their neighbors by getting together in small gatherings, getting to know new neighbors, having block parties or social gatherings. Block Captains can encourage their responsible areas to get together, turn outside lights on, and show support for Community Watch and the Police Department.

This year, August 3rd is also the date of our Annual Volunteer Appreciation night at Canon Park from 5-7 pm. We urge all Area Coordinators and Block Captains to attend, if they are not previously committed to a neighborhood gathering. The usual fare of hotdogs, chips, sodas, etc., will be available. Village of Pinehurst and Moore County officials will be there to show their appreciation to the Community Watch Volunteers. Those wishing to volunteer for Community Watch are welcome to attend.

The Ordinance only allows carts on Village-owned streets where the posted speed limit is 35 mph or less. Please remember that all vehicular laws are applicable for carts and use extra caution while driving golf carts on public streets. Those registering their carts will receive a packet of information including a map of roads that carts may operate upon in addition to their stickers.

CONSERVATION CORNER

I Recycle... But what do I do with...???

The Pinehurst Recycling Program has grown over the last few years, from one in which

a few "green" citizens participated to a program that has gained widespread support. The list of acceptable recyclable items has increased, items no longer need to be separated, and once a week pickups are now being made.

Still, there are items that cannot be put into the household recycling bin. These include tires, medicines, batteries, cooking oil. paint (wet), compact fluorescent lights, electronics and pesticides. So how should a conscientious citizen, who doesn't want to simply dump these items into the trash, dispose of them?

The Pinehurst Conservation Commission has a very active Recycling Committee that is working on a program to solve this problem. The program, called "Pinehurst Partners in Recycling" is working with local businesses to establish "partners" who will accept these products for recycling. Once the program is up and running "one-pagers" will be developed and put on the Village web site, explaining where to take such items.

In the meantime, follow the guidelines below for disposing of these items:

 Oil and car batteries - These can be recycled at the Hillcrest Recycling Center located on Hwy. 15-501 in Carthage or at most retail outlets that sell these items. Dry batteries

(household batteries such as A, AA, C, etc.) can be discarded with regular household garbage.

- Pesticides/Insecticides There is currently not a recycling center in Moore County for these items. The Moore County Cooperative Extension holds a recycling day for these types of products. They can be reached at (910) 947-3188 for further information. A Hazardous Waste Collection Day was held in November 2009 at Pinecrest High School and may be repeated sometime in the future.
- Paint cans These are picked up with regular household trash if the paint in the can is completely dried. Paint left in liquid form will not be picked up. The dried paint and can must be placed in a separate bag. (Note: pouring cat litter into the paint can will dry the paint)
- Used tires The Moore County Landfill located at 456 Turning Leaf Way off Hwy #5 will accept up to five (5) used tires at a time for recycling. They can be contacted at (910) 295-4202.
- Toner/Ink cartridges These are generally accepted for recycling at retail establishments that sell these products.
- Electronic Equipment These are accepted at some of the local big box electronic stores, and are usually limited to two per person per day. Call a store to determine whether it participates.
- Medicines Operation Medicine Drop was held in March 2010 to accept and properly dispose of unused and expired medications. It was co-hosted by local Law Enforcement Agencies and Safe Kids Mid-Carolinas Region. It may be repeated in the future.



assistance helps leverage the Village's staff and assists us in doing our best for Pinehurst. We could use more people like Bob."





Village of Pinehurst Fiscal Year 2010-2011 Budget



The FY 2010-2011 Budget for the Village of Pinehurst was adopted by the Village Council on June 8, 2010. The budget was developed based on directives from the Village Council and other sound budgetary principles. These key directives included containing operating costs, investing in our infrastructure, maintaining basic Village services. maintaining current tax rate, and funding Comprehensive Plan Initiatives equivalent to \$.03 of the tax

rate. The budget also recommends increasing the Village's fund balance policy from 27%-33% to 30%-40% of expenditures. This will strengthen the Village fiscally and bring us more in line with our peers.

The FY 2010-2011 recommended net budget, which includes all funds less transfers between funds, totals \$15,567,614. This is a decrease of 1.36% over the prior year's amended net budget. In the General Fund, the current ad valorem tax rate of \$0.28 per \$100 valuation is maintained. The General Fund Budget also maintains fund balance at 33% of FY 2010-2011 expenditures, which is within the recommended range of 30%-40%.

Major initiatives of the recommended budget include focusing on containing operating costs, guiding and managing residential and business development, expanding the automated trash collection system, adding to our greenway system, improving the Village's transportation system, and completing storm water drainage control projects.

Capital outlays of \$1,405,800 are included in the recommended budget. Some of the more notable items include, Police patrol vehicle replacements, downtown parking improvements, additions to the greenway system, additional brick sidewalks, stormwater projects, and two small automated solid waste vehicles.

Although the budget does not fund all the requests made by departments, it is set to maintain the provision of quality services for our citizens during these challenging economic times.

The annual budget as presented serves as a policy document, operations guide, financial plan and a communications device. We trust that the budget document provides you with a clear vision of Village's operations for the upcoming fiscal year. Expect to see RED at many Village events promoting recycling. RED will also be visiting Pinehurst Elementary School during the spring recycling presentations that are given each year by members of the Village's Recycling Committee.

Getting involved in recycling is very easy in the Village of Pinehurst as curbside collection is provided each week to every household and all materials may be comingled in one single container or bag. No sorting of newspapers, magazines, plastic, glass, etc. is necessary. Just place it all in one bag or container the place it curbside on your appointed day and it will be collected.

Pedestrians Must Use Sidewalks And Yield The Right Of Way

Many of our residents are taking advantage of the warmer weather by taking morning and evening walks. However, did you know by North Carolina General Statute 20-174 (d) states that "Where sidewalks are provided, it shall be unlawful for any pedestrian to walk along and upon an adjacent roadway. Where sidewalks are not provided, any pedestrian walking along and upon a highway shall, when practicable, walk only on the extreme left of the roadway or its shoulder facing traffic which may approach form the opposite direction. Such pedestrian shall yield the right-of-way to approaching traffic."

The police department would appreciate all of our walkers and joggers to use the sidewalks and/ or greenways where they are provided. If you have to walk or jog on the roadway always do it facing oncoming traffic; use the shoulder of the road or the extreme edge of the roadway when no shoulder is available. When traffic approaches you, please move out of the roadway until the traffic has passed. It is highly recommended that you wear bright clothing with a reflective vest or belt and carry a small flashlight in the early morning or late evening. With this in mind the police department wishes everyone a safe and an enjoyable walk or run throughout the Village.
